In-Person Learning

- All students return to inperson classes, activities and events
- Physical distancing as much as possible with or without limiting classroom capacity
- Masks recommended
- Increased sanitation



Hybrid Learning


- Students and teachers engage in a combination of virtual and in-person classes, activities and events
- Physical distancing while limiting capacity of classrooms
- Masks recommended when in common areas, in groups and when 6ft of distancing is not possible Increased sanitation



Virtual Learning

- Students and teachers engage in virtual-only classes, activities and events
- Only essential personnel
 on the school grounds
- Masks recommended
- Increased sanitation

*Total Responses: 5157



Could these learning options work?






Top Concerns from Families

Timeline:

Staff feedback sessions, Family Engagement Survey #2 CRCSD will communicate to families which Return to Learn plan will be implemented.



Safety Measures:

*All staff will be required and students will be strongly recommended to wear facial PPE (masks and/or face shields)

- *Minimizing student and staff exposure with smaller student to teacher ratios
- *Social distancing as much as possible
- *Increased cleaning and sanitation procedures

*Additional safety routines (such as meals eaten in classrooms, hand washing, arrival and dismissal procedures to minimize contact)

Elementary Schools

In Person

All PK-5 students can return to a building and will be assigned a "homeroom" teacher for the year, and we are projecting no more than 20 students per room. ELL and students with IEPs will still receive targeted support.

Students and staff would follow recommended health and safety guidelines and would minimize contact: Masks will be required for students at all times with age appropriate breaks and appropriate accommodations made for those needing it; masks and/or shields will be required for staff at all times; breakfast and lunch will be held in classrooms; arrival and dismissal time will be designed for minimal contact.

Paras will be responsible for a range of support services in the building to maintain health and safety guidelines.

Virtual

Students not able or willing to return in person will participate in CRCSD Virtual Homeroom, with a single elementary taught by teachers not able to return.

Teachers not able to return may be teaching students from across CRCSD, depending on the option families select.

The online format for required remote learning is significantly more structured than spring's continuous learning model, and will include scheduled remote learning, asynchronous instruction, and paper packets. Attendance will be required.







Secondary Schools

In Person

All 6-8 students can return to in-person instruction and would be assigned an advisory teacher. Each advisory cohort would remain the same to limit contact between students. Teachers may rotate on no less than 3 week cycles, however, fewer rotations are recommended to limit exposure. The HS teams are working on a different structure, but they will use structures that already exist to organize students and limit contact: geography of the school, advisory or homeroom structures, and department/course structures.

Advisory teachers would facilitate instruction that is delivered from a content area teacher via online lessons.

Student to teacher ratios would be approximately 20:1. In the MS. We are seeking options for HS students; the variety of courses is more challenging. ELL and students with IEPs will receive targeted support.

Students and staff would follow recommended health and safety guidelines and would minimize contact. Masks will be required for students at all times with age appropriate breaks and appropriate accommodations made for those needing it; masks and/or shields will be required for staff at all times.

Breakfast and lunch will be served to cohorts. Arrival and dismissal time will be designed for minimal contact.

Teacher teams will work to create a uniform online course for each grade level and content area.

Virtual

Students not able or willing to return in person will participate in CRCSD Virtual Advisory, with a single middle class or high school course taught by teachers not able to return in person.

Teachers not able to return may be teaching students from across CRCSD, depending on the option families select.


Teachers will be grouped into PLCs by grade level at the MS and course at the HS to adapt CRCSD curriculum into common virtual courses. For example, all 8th grade teachers will be an 8th grade PLC and will use a single 8th grade math class delivered virtually. That same model could be applied to HS Geometry.

The online format for required remote learning is significantly more structured than spring's continuous learning model, and will include scheduled remote learning, asynchronous instruction, and paper packets. Attendance will be required.
