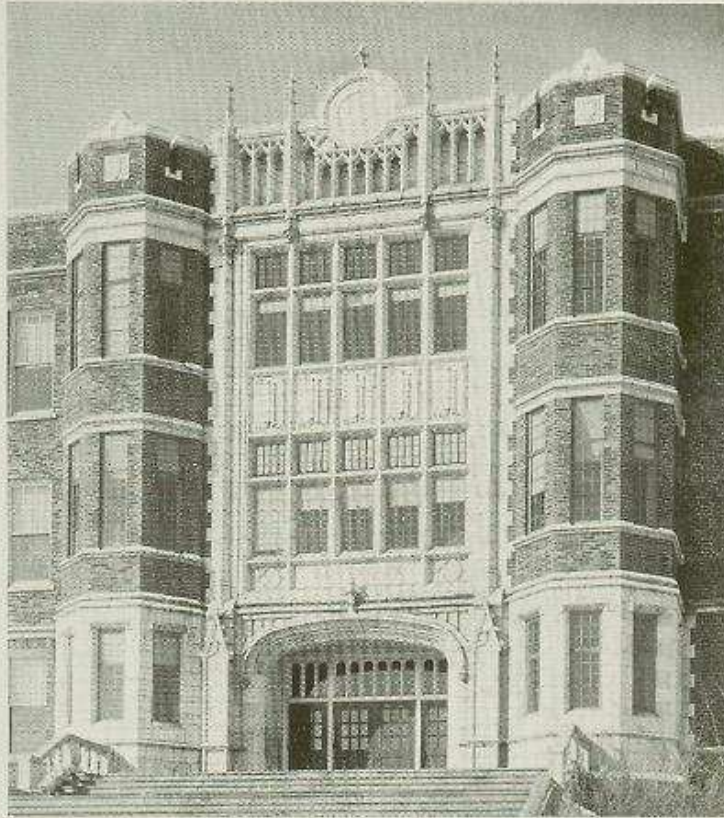


### ROOSEVELT

### JUNE 1937, CLASS HISTORY

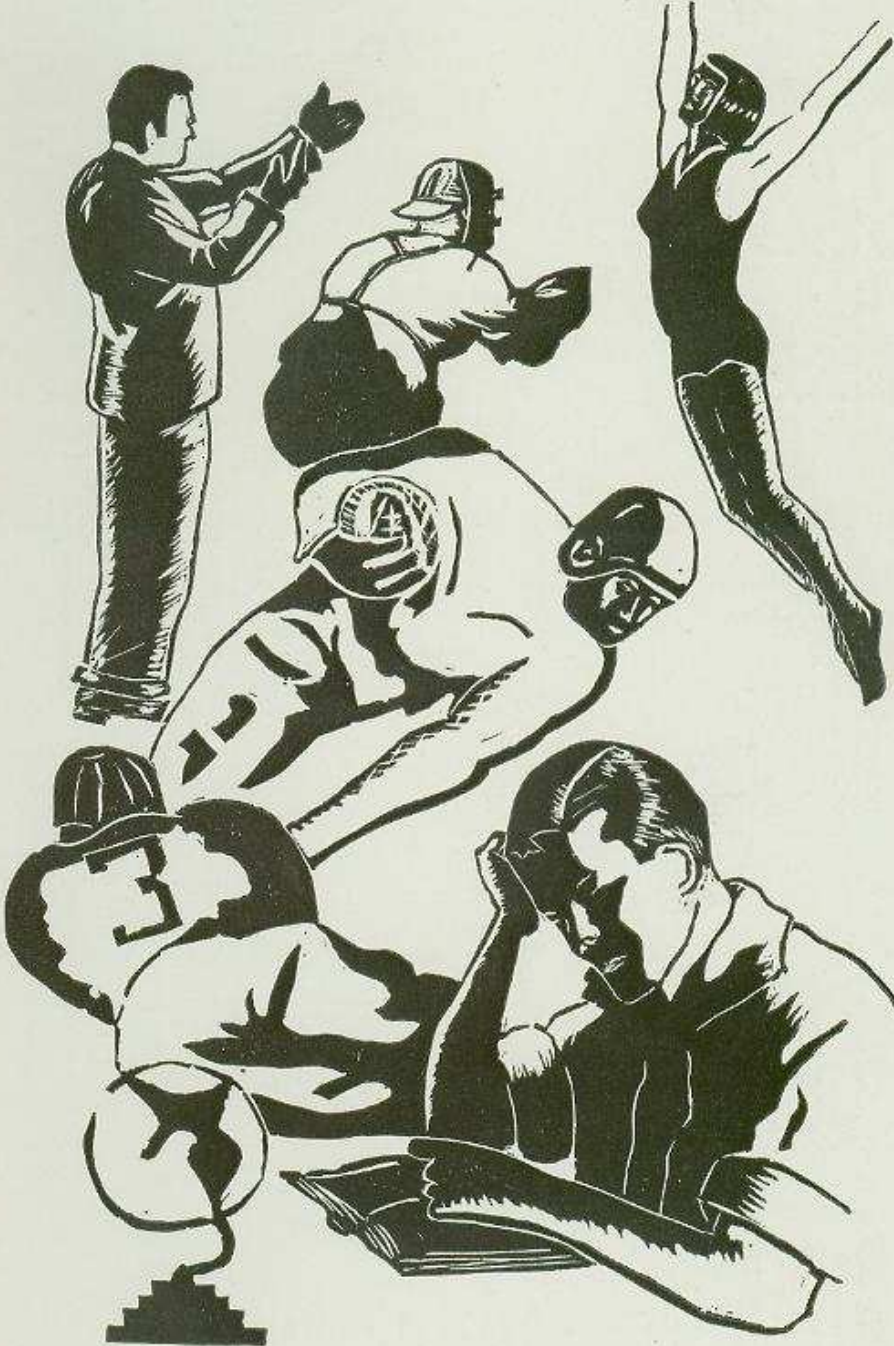
In the fall of 1934, 220 freshmen were rounded up, 41 boys and 47 girls from Wilson, 66 boys and 66 girls from Roosevelt, and herded down to Grant High School. After the strangeness of the new educational grazing grounds had worn off, the yearlings combined their home room classes for a party in the gym, made entertaining by Mr. Nichols of the Playground Commission and made satisfying by timely refreshments. Previously, Carl Fjellman had been elected President; Calvin Pratt, Vice-President; and James King, Secretary-Treasurer. At the mid-semester our newly found Wilson friends departed to their native regions; in March, 1935, the Roosevelt freshmen followed suit, 135 strong.

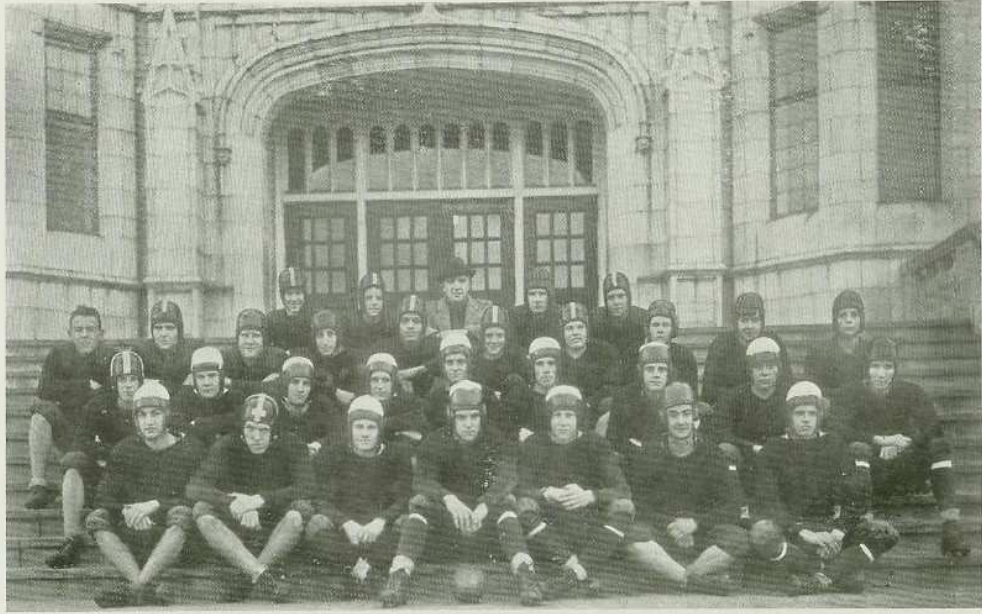
John Clemens, Russell Greene, and Jeanne Kelly were the Junior Class Officers. In the spring of 1936 we entertained the graduating class at the Junior-Senior Prom.

As seniors, we elected James Holton, President; Ray Stumpff, Vice-President; and Eleanor Lockwood, Secretary-Treasurer. Then, with 105 of the original 132 remaining, the spring class of 1937 stampeded down the home stretch of its school career.

## 1936 — FOOTBALL — 1936

The second season of football for Roosevelt was not as successful as the first, as far as records go. However, the Rough Riders continued to supply good, exciting football, whether they won or lost. The hardest blows of the season were the losses of two of the intra-city games, which resulted in the loss of the city title. October 8 marked the defeat of Roosevelt by Franklin. Franklin came back strong to win by 13-6 after the Rough Riders had scored the first touchdown early in the game. Roosevelt turned the tables in the McKinley game and emerged with a victory after outscoring them two touchdowns to one. The game with Wilson showed very clearly the importance of making that point after the touchdown. After trailing 6-0, Wilson scored in the last quarter, and by making that final point, which Roosevelt had failed to do, won the game and left Roosevelt, McKinley, and Wilson tied for second place.

In the All-Star game the Rough Riders avenged their feelings somewhat by combining with McKinley and defeating the Wilson-Franklin team, 20-0.

## 1936 — BASKETBALL — 1937

The 1936-37 basketball season put Roosevelt back into the championship circles. By winning all but one of their scheduled games, the Rough Riders retained the intra-city traveling trophy for another year and also took top honors in the Mississippi Valley Conference. The only game lost was a two point defeat at the hands of Davenport in a double overtime game. This outstanding record was attained in spite of two important losses at the mid-semester: Bill Diehl, veteran guard, graduated; Coach Martin accepted a new position at Racine, Wisconsin. The latter left a then undefeated team in the middle of a tough schedule with a coach they had never seen before. However, it was the new coach, Mr. Wolfe, who was really on the spot. He had a team he had seen only a few times in action, with a perfect record, and all eyes were on him to see if they remained on top under the new coach. Mr. Wolfe proved his capability by doing his part in bringing them through for two important championships.

The Rough Riders started the sectional tournament in top form by easily defeating McKinley and Marion. In the finals they suffered their second defeat of the season, when Franklin, which Roosevelt had defeated twice earlier in the season, nosed them out by two points.

As a whole, Roosevelt enjoyed a very successful basketball season, losing only two close games and winning both the city and Mississippi Valley Championships.

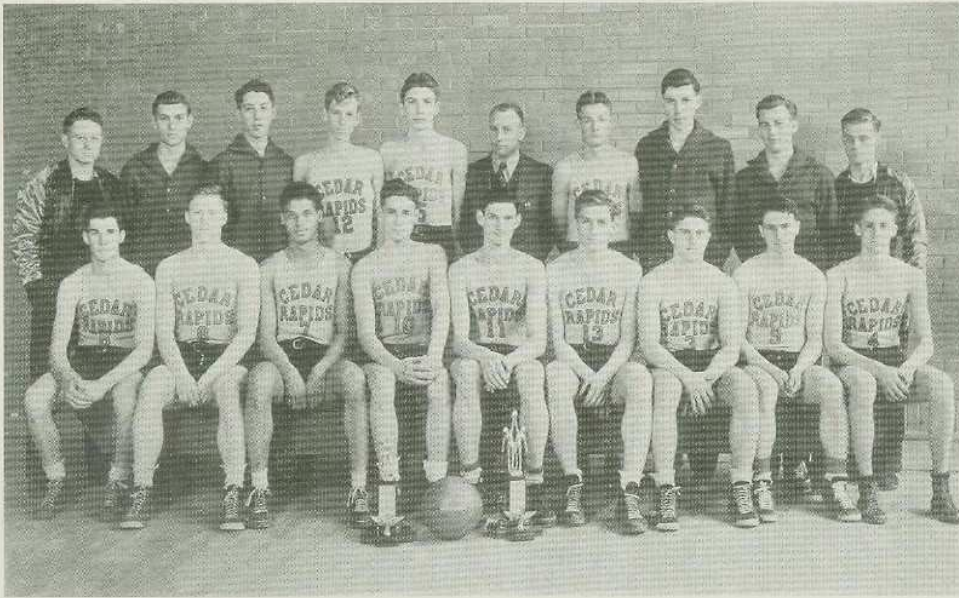

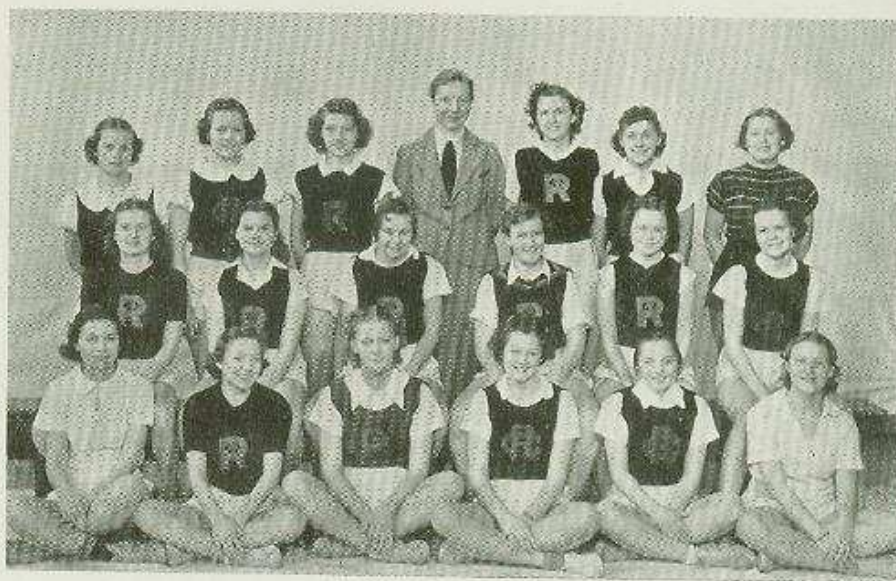

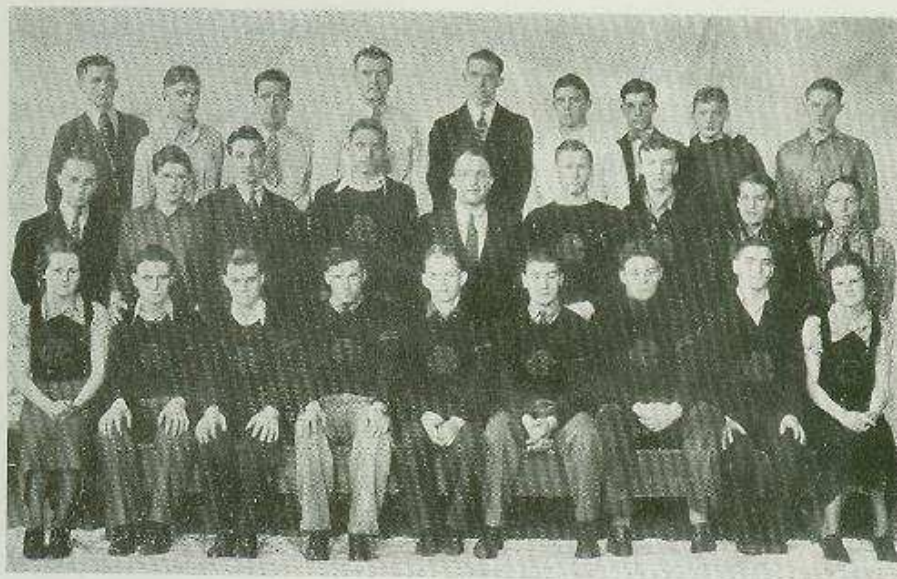
The final requirement is the skill tests. A girl must pass a standard rating in these before she is invited to be a member.

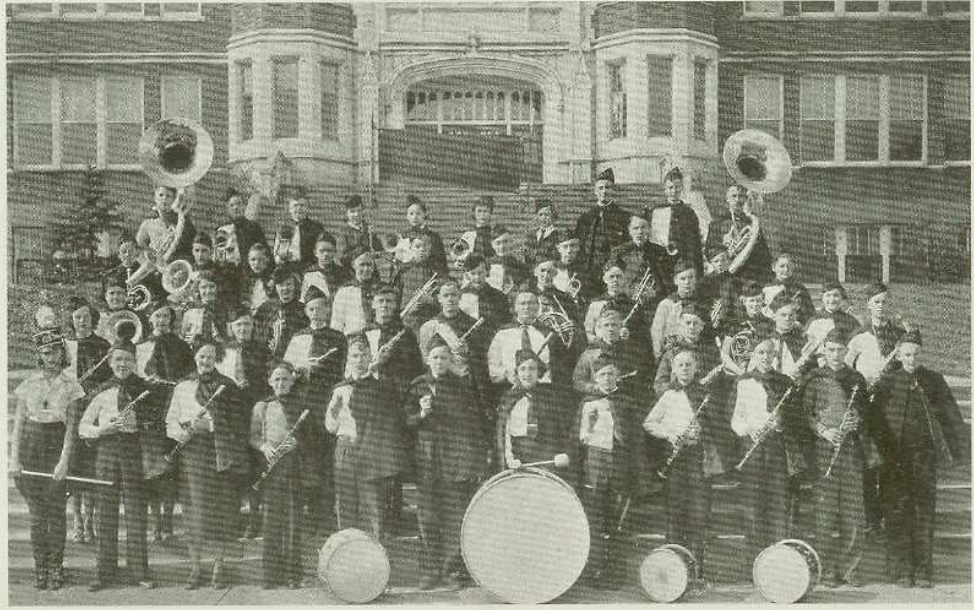
The Boys Glee Club is an organization which aims principally to teach boys to sing in harmony and to appreciate the finer types of music.

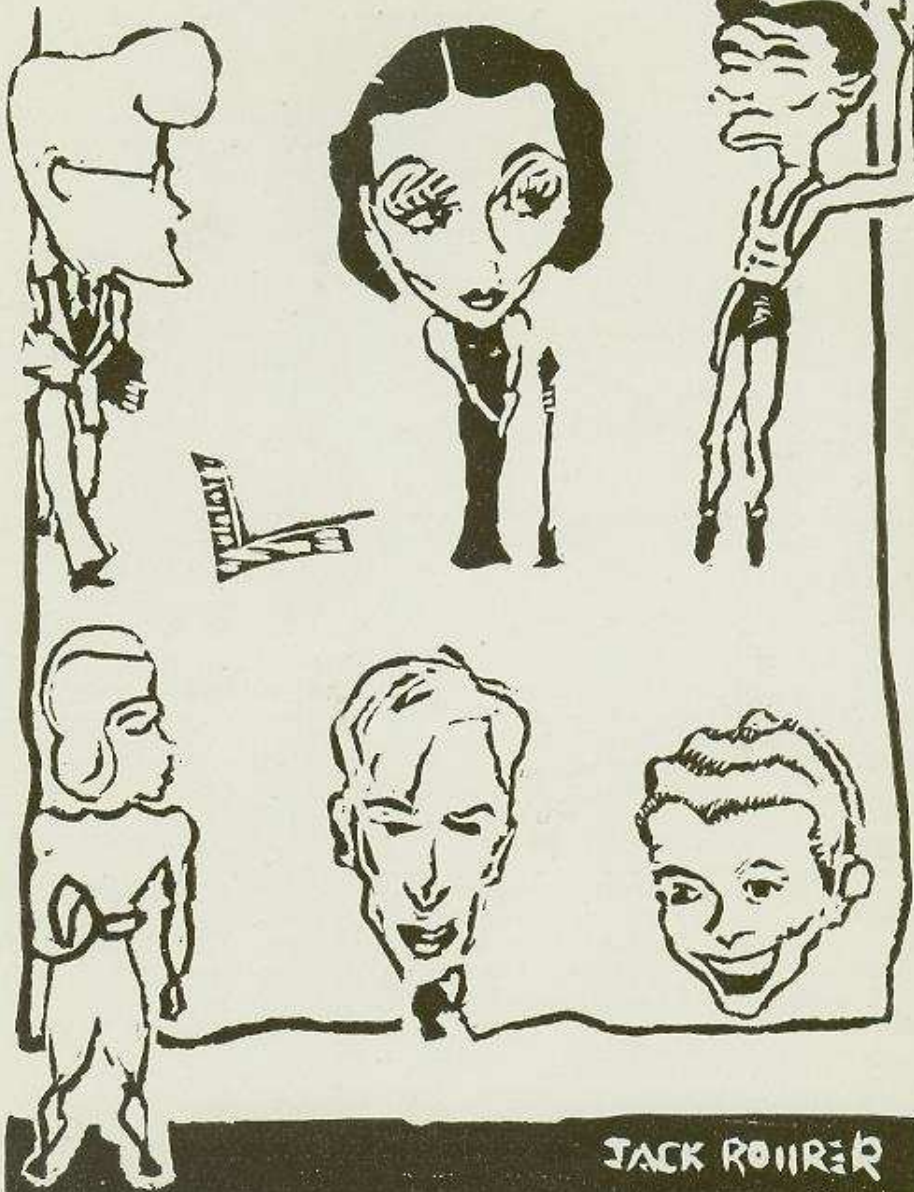
## MARCHING BAND
