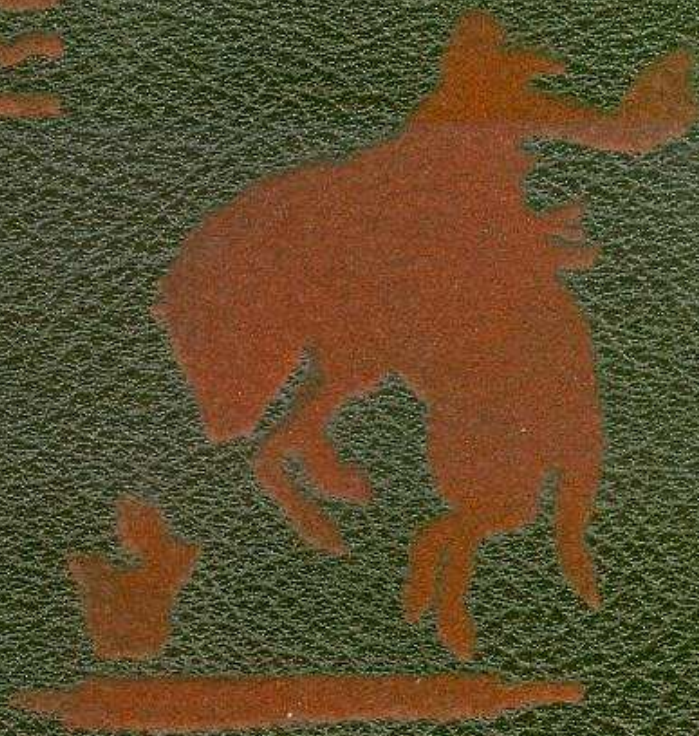
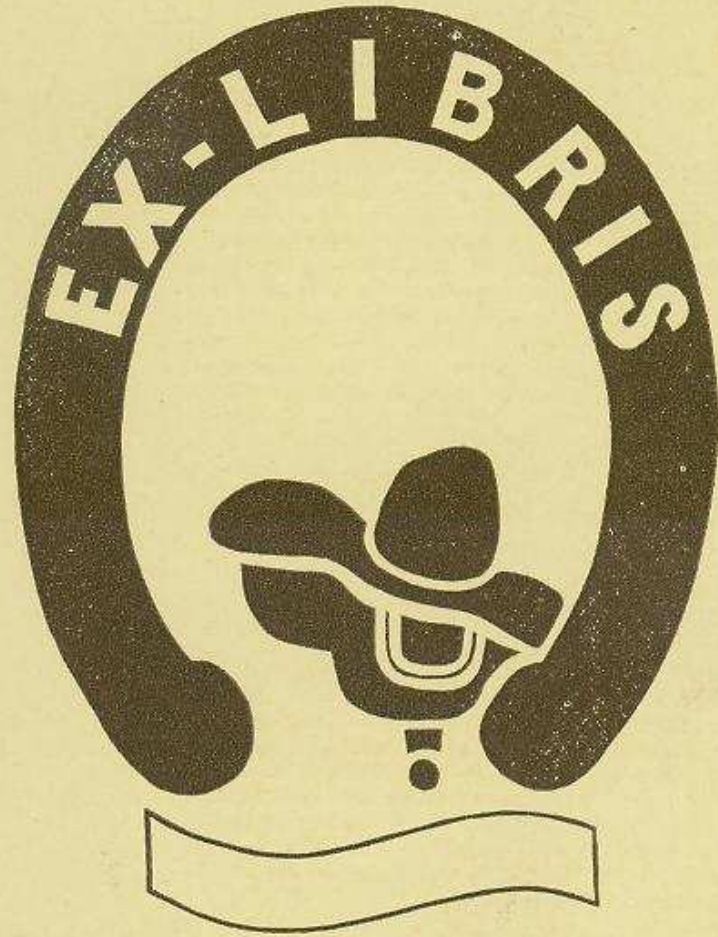

ADMINISTRATORS

Mr. Kluss, who came to Grant from Waterloo in 1928, continued in his position of senior high principal after moving from Grant into our new six-year high school, in 1935. This position gives him the responsibility of administering the courses as set forth by the Board of Education. He also assigns teachers to their classes, supervises their instruction and that toward the pupils, secures needed supplies, and keeps the building conditions adequate. He supervises the registration, attendance, discipline, and choice of subjects of the students.



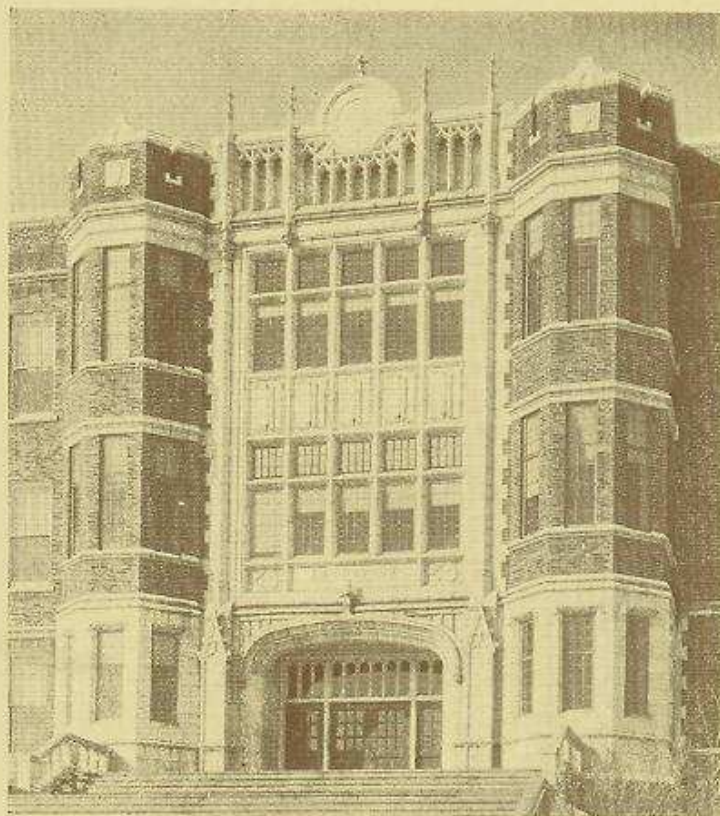

Transferred to the new building, Roosevelt, she has continued in this position. She has charge of the clubs and social calendar and N. Y. A. work. All 10B girls are interviewed and helped by her, as are the 12A girls in regard to colleges or positions after leaving school. She is also the sponsor of the Tri-Blue Girl Reserve Club.



After graduating from Grant, Sara Slusky worked as a stenographer at Wilson, Hayes, and the Board of Education. In 1931 she was transferred to Grant, coming to Roosevelt in 1935 with the advent of the new six-year high school system. As secretary to Mr. Kluss she carried out his instructions. She is accredited with the high accuracy of records, typing, mimeographing, and the accounting of the student activities fund.

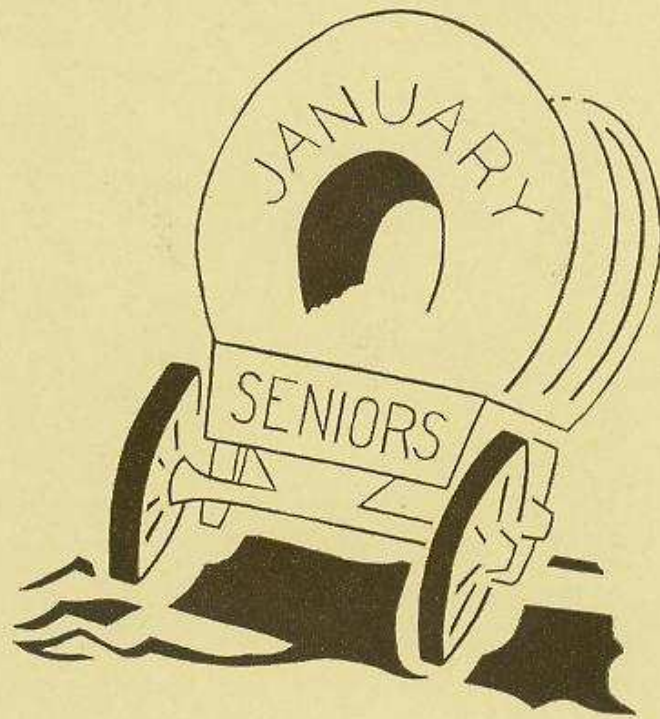

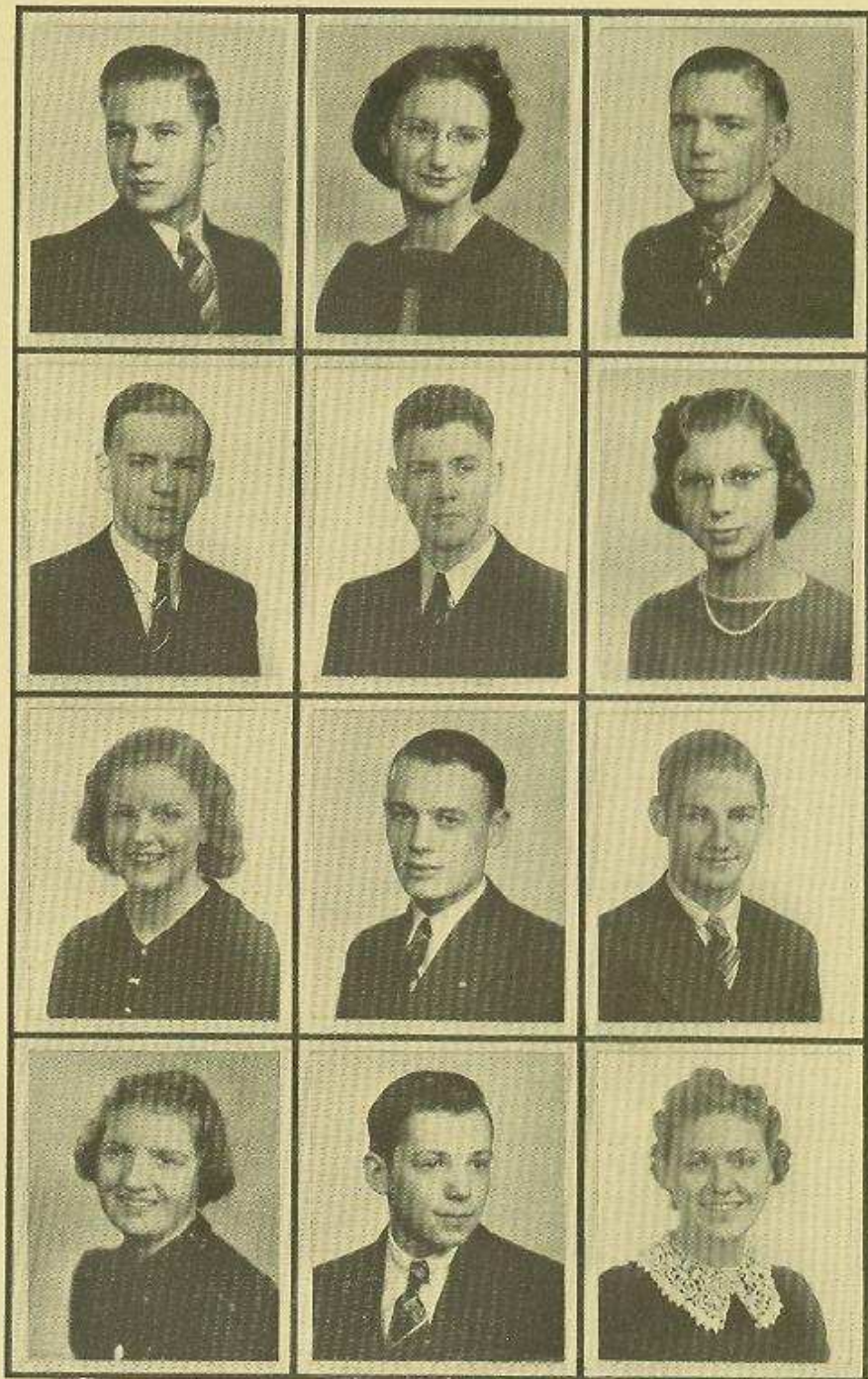

"THE GRUMBLER"

We, the January graduating class of 1939, after much careful deliberation, research, study and concentration, have caused to be written down in the simplest of language a few of the multitudinous faults of this school and the gross personal injustices rendered toward us by the faculty.

First of all, I shall enumerate, as briefly as possible, various items which we have decided should come under the heading of personal grievances.

Thousands upon thousands of dollars have been spent upon elaborately equipped and modern gymnasiums in which to give our muscles adequate exercise. In all this orgy of spending one small but infinitely important group of muscles has been carelessly overlooked. These muscles are the Pharyngopalatinus, the salpingopharyngeus, the constrictor pharyngeus superior and the glossopalatinus; in the language of you undergraduates, the jaw muscles. There is a rule of long standing in this school that the teachers shall not allow pupils to chew gum in the classrooms, a most unjust law, to say the least. Out of the 24 hours which make up a day—approximately 2 hours only, are spent in exercise of the jaw muscles. Because many pupils do not take it upon themselves to give their jaws a little extra exercise through recitation in class, we recommend that at least these unfortunate be allowed to chew gum whenever they so desire.

Much valuable time and energy which could be used to improve our minds has been wasted daily because there is no vertical means of transportation. The fact that so many boys (and some girls) must travel hourly from the library clear to the office on 4th floor has caused 25 cases of broken arches in our class alone! Now we are conservative enough to realize that the elevators which the classes before us have pleaded so vainly for involve too much expense. We do not ask for elevators—we merely request escalators, in order that we may reduce this most alarming toll of "flat-foot floogies." Let us suppose that even the small expense of an escalator cannot be met. We have another more economical plan. In brief, it is this. Move the office to the basement where it will be easily accessible. If there isn't room for both the boiler room and the office in the basement it would be a comparatively simple matter to move the boiler room upstairs to where the office was.

Another great hardship which we have been made to endure all these years is walking the long distance to and from school. Some have to walk a whole block—some two—and some even three! This condition cannot and must not be endured. Some students have been obliged to stay home because of rain, and even when the weather is good the long distance causes repeated tardiness. We propose that the school be moved within one-half block of every student's home.

The familiar and repulsive slips which we are obliged to receive when we are tardy have also been a constant source of irritation to us all. The words I AM LATE written in huge flaming red letters have caused us much grief and embarrassment. The fact that serious inferiority complexes have developed from this mistreatment should be sufficient reminder that something must be done. We recommend that the type be the smallest possible and that the slips be small enough to be hidden under any compact.

There has been a rumor which we have verified by careful investigation that girls are not excused from school to get permanents! You have no doubt noticed how badly kept and untidy some girls' hair is. This is the direct cause. A disgraceful condition it is indeed, when we are not allowed to maintain a high standard of personal appearance. Let us assume that this rule cannot be changed. We have what we consider to be an excellent idea. Why not install permanent wave machines in every history class whereby girls can get permanents by inserting \$2.50 in a slot. This method of waving has a double advantage in that the girls can do their own hair and thus have it exactly like they want it. And the boys are not to be overlooked in this consideration of personal appearance. There are no facilities whereby boys may shave off their downy beards which sometimes begin to appear before high school age. Boys, your budding beards should be kept clean shaven by the same slot machine method whereby the girls obtain their permanents. Electric razors should be installed in the history class so that you may shave yourselves for 25 cents during the study period. The old shaving mug, lather and brush may have been a sufficient argument against this improvement in days gone by—but in these modern times of the electric razor there is no adequate excuse.

Students have been repeatedly told that they must not promenade around the halls. Thus they are heedlessly deprived of their only time for relaxation, gossip, and flirtation. We assume, of course, that this rule cannot be broken. A plan should be adopted whereby the building would be made to revolve—thus giving the pupils the same sensation while they remain standing still.

Another source of great irritation to pupils is the fact that there is no place in this immense school building where one may telephone privately. It is necessary to use the telephone in the office where the principal and two office girls do nothing but stand gawking and listening to one's private conversation. Under these dire circumstances it is impossible to make dates and whisper endearing words. Sound-proof telephone booths should be installed on each floor whereby pupils can phone privately and free of charge.

Another complaint which we have to make against the interior decorating of Roosevelt High is the wishy-washy neutral green of the walls. We have noticed (particularly in the study halls) that the pupils are easily lulled to sleep by this uninspiring color. In order to overcome this difficulty we propose that the walls be painted fiery scarlet, flaming orange, and dazzling purple in order to stimulate the pupils if not to activity, at least to wakefulness.

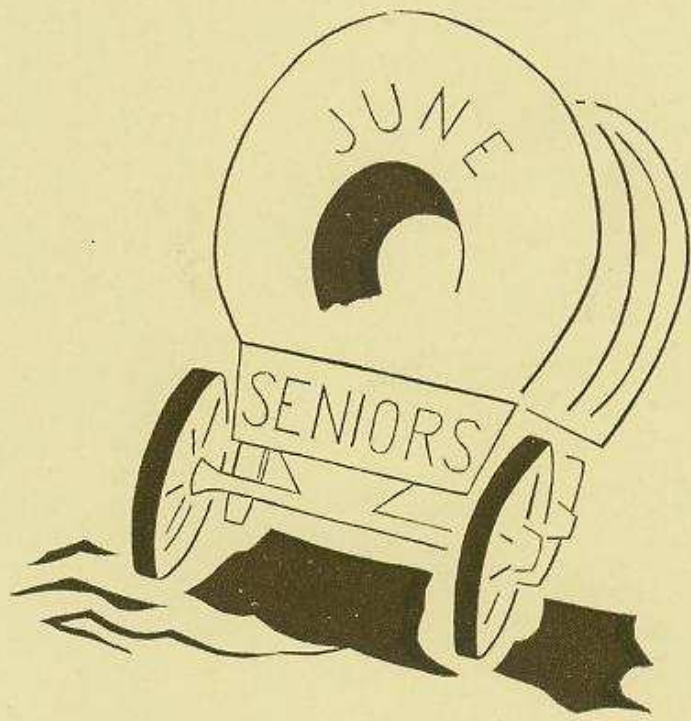

Instead of just proposing innumerable plans for improvements of this school we have given you in addition good sound remedies. Our purpose is to improve this school through which we so valiantly struggled—and we wish to add that unless these improvements are made it is extremely doubtful whether you underclassmen will be able to graduate.

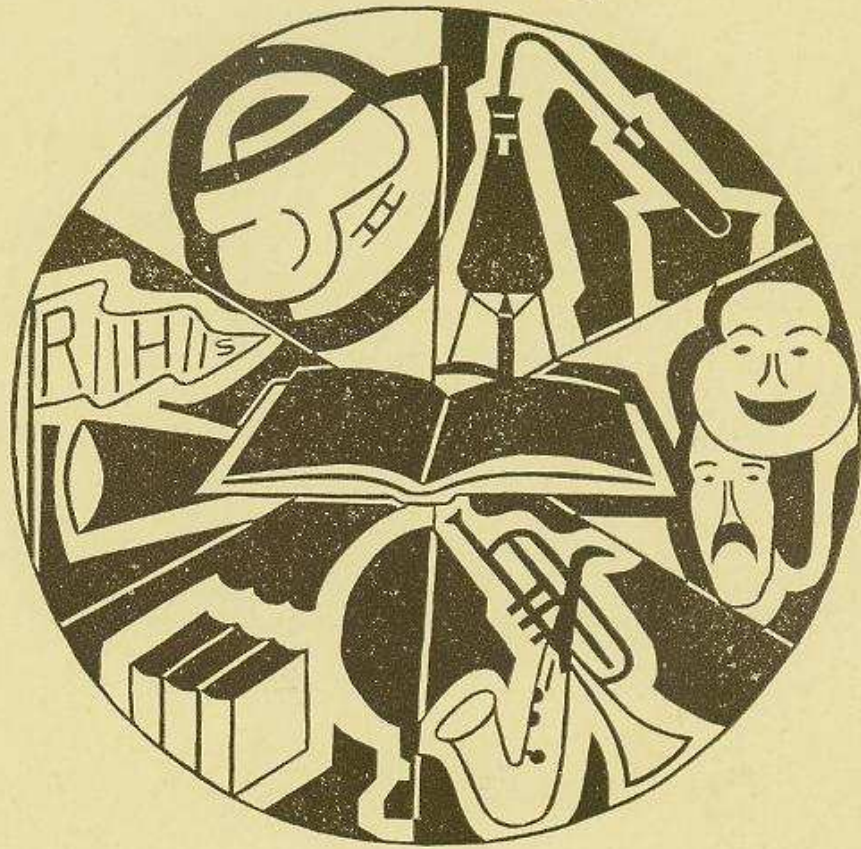
Remember when we were grown-up (?) 10B's and thought we owned the entire school?

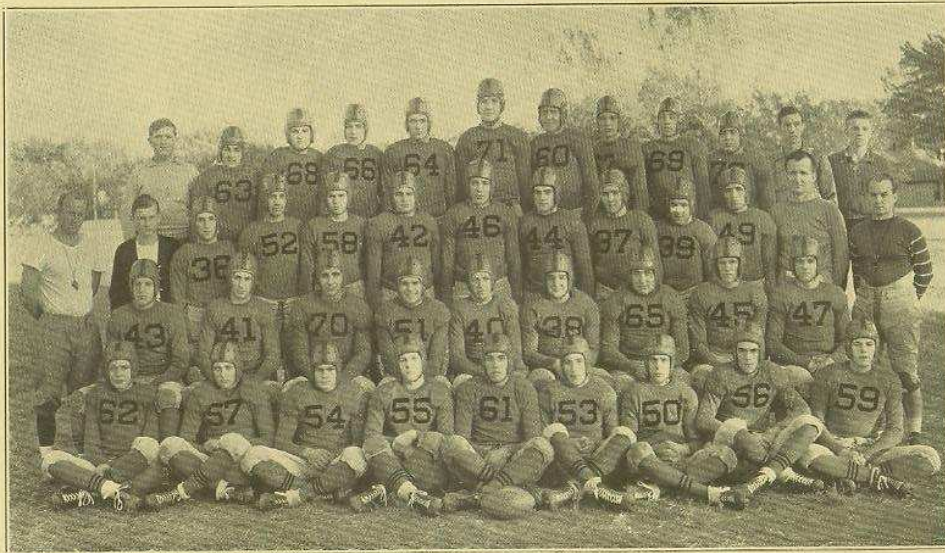

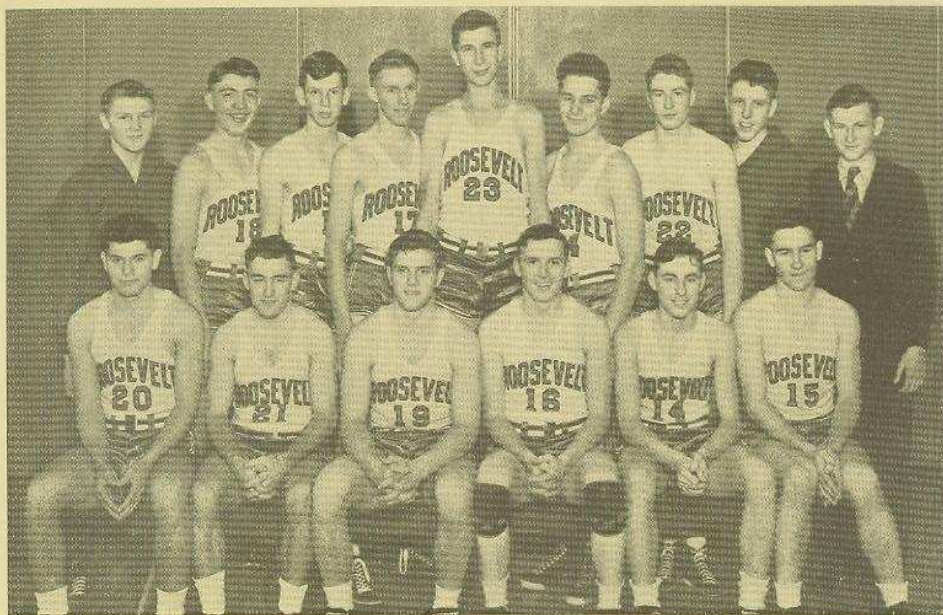

1938 BASKETBALL 1939

The Roosevelt Rough Riders basketball squad started the season with one letterman, Howard Hammill. Due to a football injury he was unable to play during the latter part of the first semester. The five players who carried the brunt of the Roosevelt attack throughout the season were from the sophomore squad. Having lost five of the first six games played, they were scarcely considered as sectional or district contenders. But things began to happen and Roosevelt improved immeasurably. Their plays began to click. Roosevelt then started on her victory march, beginning by beating Franklin, old city rivals, by a three-point margin. Roosevelt went on to take the city championship and to win the rest of the season's games by beating Franklin in a very exciting game, 50-40; incidentally one of the largest total scores ever compiled in this area.

For points collected during the season including tournament games, Emory Sample was high point man of the Roosevelt team with a total of 161 points. Eugene Zisko was second with a total of 136 points.

Emory Sample placed fifth among the high scorers in the Mississippi Valley Conference with a total of 88 points collected in Conference games. Bob Multhaup placed tenth with 62 points.

Eugene Zisko was named on the second Iowa Daily Press Association team.

Howard Hammill was elected honorary captain for the first semester and Eugene Zisko for the second semester. Bob Multhaup was appointed game captain throughout most of the season.

While much credit must be given to the boys, yet the success of the team this year was due mainly to the fine job of coaching done by Mr. Wolfe.

With the squad remaining intact until the close of the first semester next winter, Roosevelt's prospects look bright for the coming season.

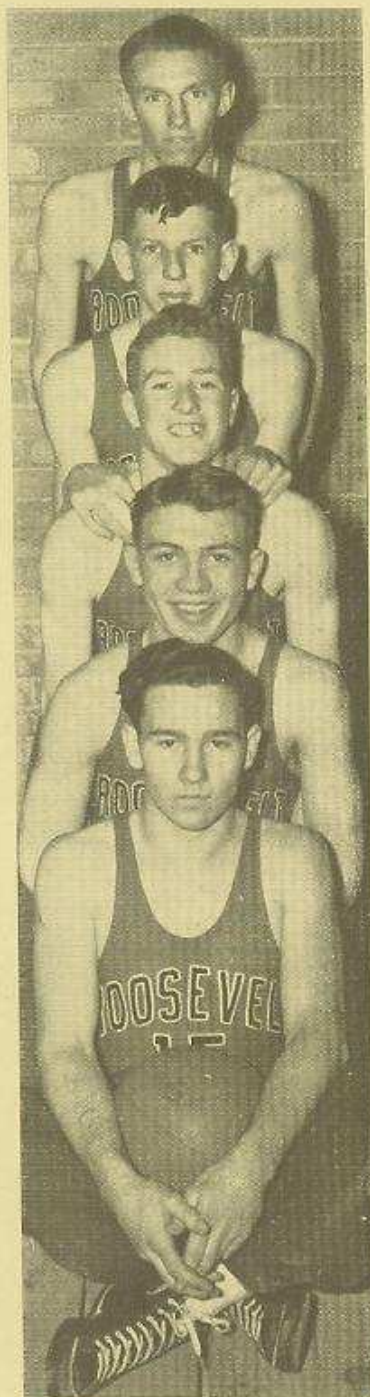

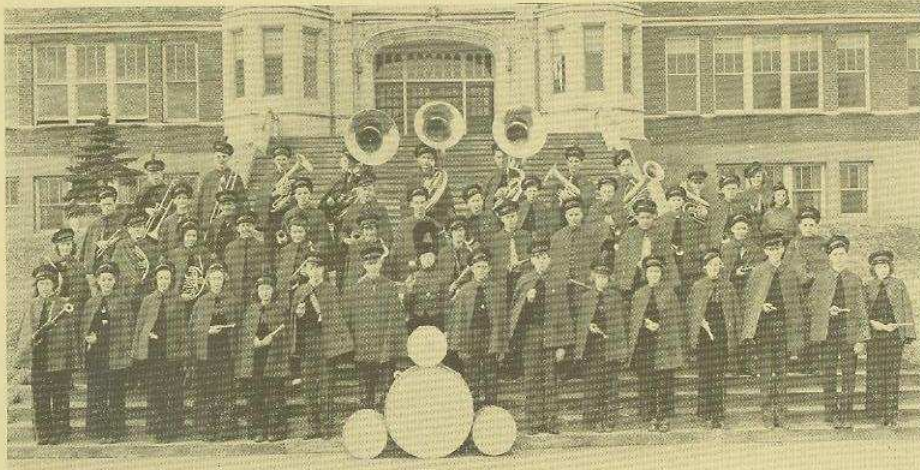
