
After a fied vote and a stuffed ballot box, the results of the typical boy and girl election were announced. They were Delores Wells and Ken Kroeger.






The Rifle Club held a meeting every Monday night at the Police Station, where the marksmen sharpened their eyes by firing at the police rifle range.


In the scoring column Russ Blood led with 145 points in 17 games, followed by Ronnie Saylor's 85 and Stewart Cooper's 75.


# Class Officers




