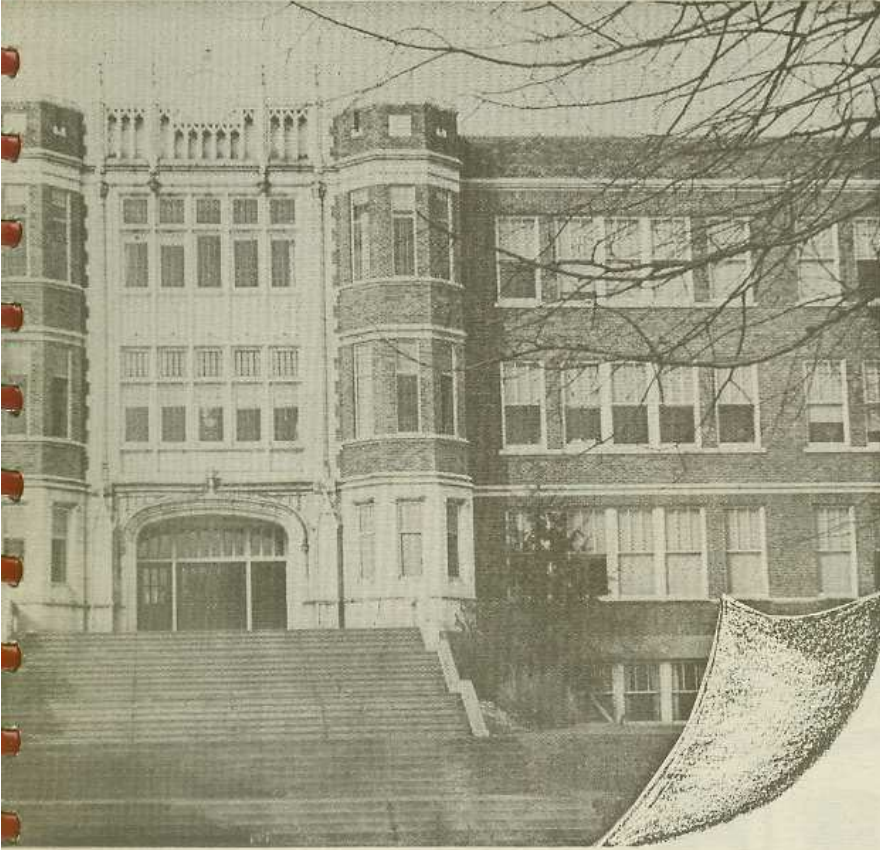

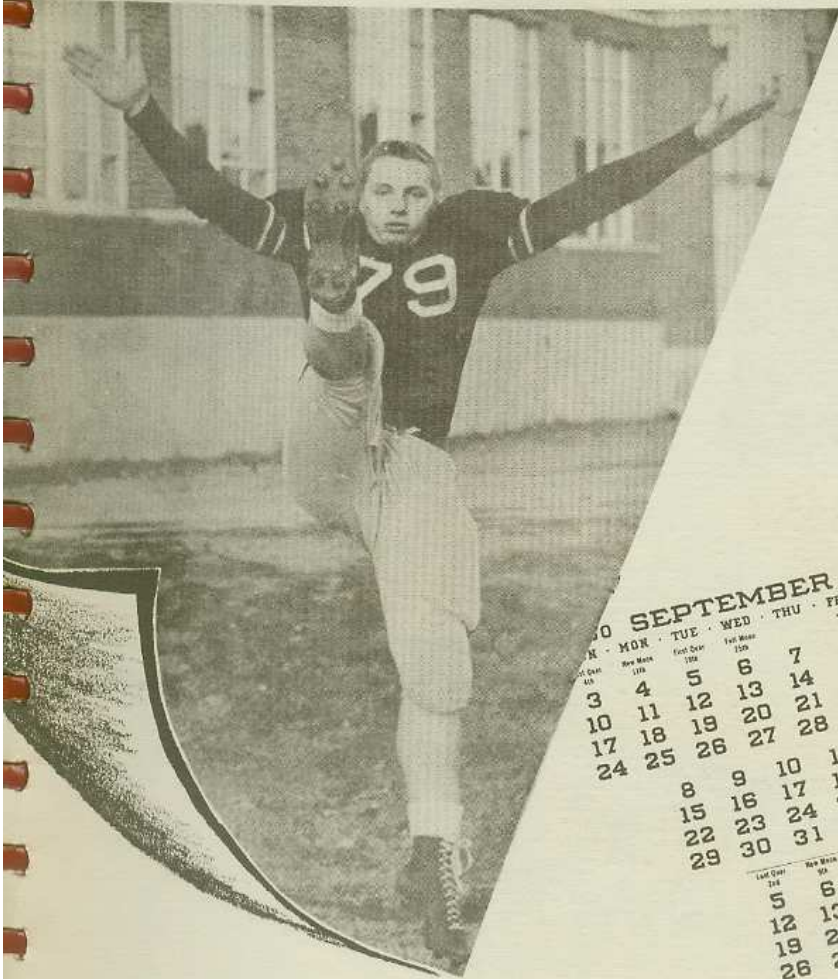

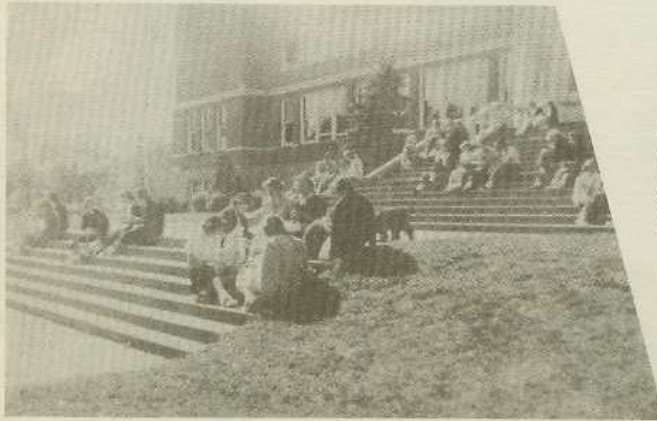
in the Fall ~

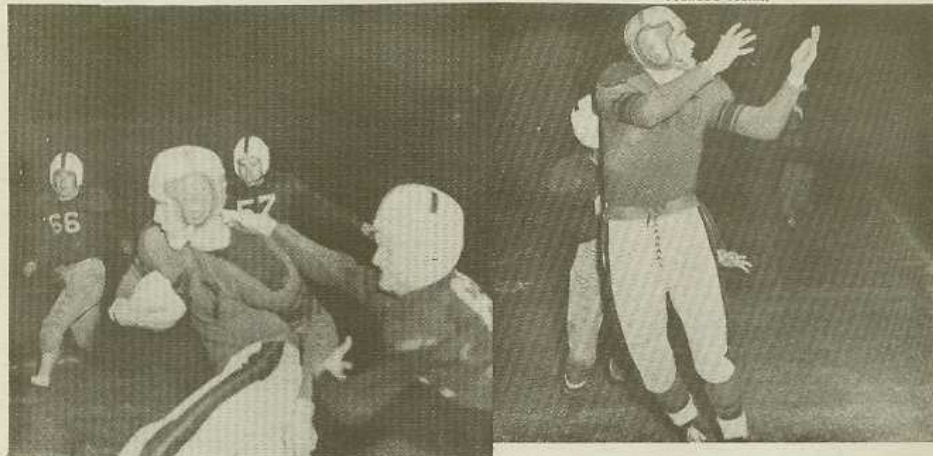

An annual award is presented in honor and memory of Glenn A. Williams, Roosevelt athlete, who met his untimely death in a football game against West Waterloo on October 20, 1939.

Glenn was being considered for a tackle on the 1939 all-state team. After his fatal injury, Glenn was given special all-state recognition by the Iowa Daily Press Association. Each June as a tribute to a typical Roughrider athlete, Roosevelt school gives a "Glenn A. Williams Memorial Award" to the major letter winner who best exemplifies the traits of the boy whose name it bears.

The outstanding athlete who received the honor in 1950 was Duane Starnes. Duane majored in football, basketball, and baseball.

Because the year book went to press before the "51" baseball season, the "50" season is written up.

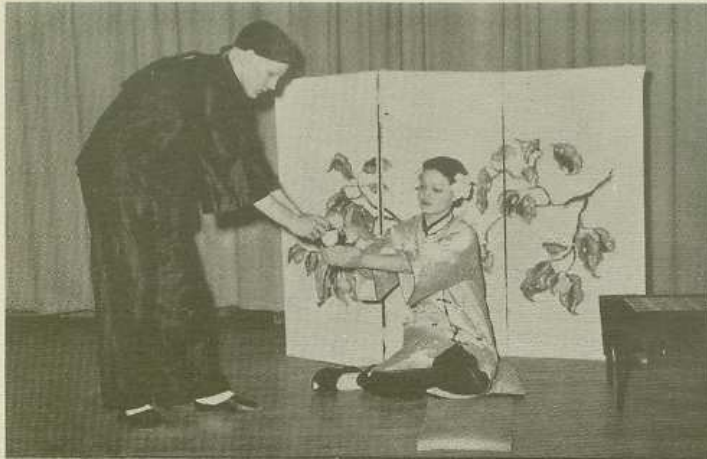
