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Covid Catch Up

Eighteen months have passed since this global pandemic hit the United States, in earnest, in February of 2020, with around 219 million Coronavirus cases and a worldwide death toll of 4.5 million people (and counting).

Still, even after all that, COVID 19 cases are on the rise both in America and abroad.

According to the CNN.com article 'Healthline,' "More than half of U.S. adults are now fully vaccinated.New COVID-19 cases are on the rise in virtually every U.S. state."

A key component to the recent rise in Covid numbers has been because of the Delta Variant (an adapted strain of COVID which researchers first discovered in the country of India in Dec. 2020). The delta variant is able to spread faster which explains the recent uprise in the numbers.

As masks become more and more unpopular only seven states still require a mask to be worn in public places: Hawaii, Illinois, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon and Washington.

Since masks have not been required, hospitals around the US are being pushed to their limits once again. "Kentucky hospital pushed to its limits," CNN's Healthline article said. "On Thursday, the governor said 60 of the state's 96 hospitals are reporting staff shortages, and there are only 90 available adult ICU beds statewide, the fewest amount available throughout the pandemic."


President Joe Biden is still working to encourage everyone that is eligible in America for the vaccine to take it.

However, millions of Americans have refused, despite the FDA formally approving the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines later this summer.

Within the last two weeks, President Biden has launched a vaccine mandate for many federal employees in an effort to get the Delta Variant under control.

At the center of Biden's new plan is directing the Labor Department to require all businesses with 100 or more employees ensure their workers are either vaccinated or tested once a week.

With many school districts in Iowa issuing new mask mandates, the controversy around COVID and the measures people take to mitigate its effects are unlikely to end anytime soon.



Afghanistan's Taliban Takeover

The Taliban, an organization who harbored Osama Bin Laden after he orchestrated the World Trade Center attacks of 9/11, has now gained complete control of the country of Afghanistan.

People within the country are uncertain of their future and Americans have been stranded inside, not knowing if the Taliban will pursue them or grant them passage.

All of this is happening as threats from an even more violent and brutal subdivision of ISIS, known as ISIS-K, are imminent.

ISIS-K

ISIS-K has been the culprit of many attacks within Afghanistan. This includes bombings near the Kabul airport where Americans were operating their evacuation missions, which killed 13 United States troops and injured more.

Many people saw this as a reason why the U.S. needed to withdraw troops from the country as it grew more unstable.

Mr. Rolwes, a history teacher at Jefferson, agreed.

"The longer this went on I think there was a chance that more service members could have been hurt or killed," Rolwes said.

ISIS- K was founded in 2015 by ex-Taliban members and has grown with new membership from several other militant groups as their influence grew.

They were held at bay in regions of Afghanistan by U.S. supported Afghan troops for years.

However, as the Taliban overpowered the Afghan military and the U.S. withdrew troops, ISIS-K was granted room to wreak havoc.

ISIS-K is now the primary threat to the Taliban and the future of interaction between the groups is uncertain. Mr. Rolwes see's a conflict between the two groups plausible.

"If the Taliban show that they are too moderate then they may find themselves in a civil war with ISIS-K," Rolwes said.

Currently there has not been a full out conflict between them, but as ISIS-K continues to attempt to destabilize the region, it is a very real possibility that war will ensue.

American Diplomacy

ISIS-K is not the only uncertainty within Afghanistan. Although thousand s of American troops and many civilians were evacuated at the end of August, according to AP News it is estimated that 100-200 Americans still reside in Afghanistan.

Mr. Rolwes shared that he is worried about these remaining troops, as well as Afghan civilians who are not being allowed to leave the country.

"The situation could lead to a great deal of regional instability as those who were not able to leave on the United States planes, were seemingly stranded," Rolwes said.

AP News reported, however, that in early September the Taliban granted around 30 Americans permission to leave the country on a plane of 200 passengers.

This has made many Americans optimistic that the Taliban will cooperate with the US to get the rest of the Americans out of the country.

Not everybody shares in this optimism however. Many people do not believe that the Taliban are going to continue their diplomatic good-faith.

This comes as the Taliban has established an interim government in Afghanistan which includes former Guantanamo Bay prisoners, and strictly excludes women.

In fact CNN says, "No women or members from Afghanistan's ousted leadership were selected for acting cabinet." This fits Mr. Rolwes concerns over "the Taliban's rigid beliefs" and how that will affect women and other loyal Afghan civilians within the country.

Social Revolution

Even as there is so much uncertainty about the Taliban and the future of the Afghan people, Mr. Rolwes expressed sentiments of hope for resistance from within the country.

"They will be ruling over a very different Afghanistan," he said. "The society is much younger and may resist their rule in ways that the Taliban didn't have to deal with when they came to power originally in the 1990's."

Rolwes is referring to a demographic change within the country that occurred after the Taliban first held control within the country.

There is now a larger class of young, educated women who have been able to exercise their rights for years, which could now be at jeopardy with the Taliban once again in power.

According to the Human Rights Watch News, the Taliban have put new rules into effect, preventing women from working, going to school and also restricting the places they can travel to.

Many people are expecting that with the Taliban tightening their grip on the Afghan people, revolts and other forms of resistance are, at least, possible and, arguably, likely.

At Jefferson High School last year all students had three options on how they choose to learn. These are In-person, Online and Hybrid.


In person, meaning students go to school everyday. They learn face to face from inside of a classroom with other people.


